the tension that rises every time we hear their name.*

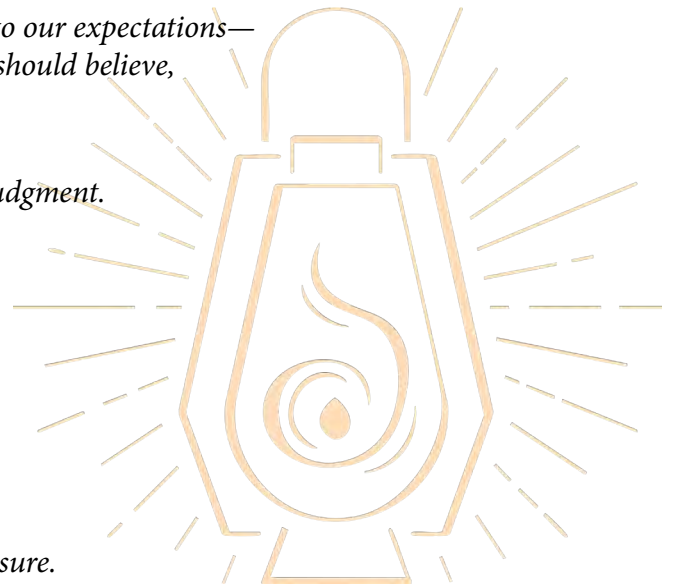
*We confess that we have clung to our expectations—

Luke's Gospel begins the story of Jesus with this opening line: "In the time of Herod..." This detail may seem minor to modern readers, however, it reveals layers of information about the fearful world Jesus entered, one filled with rampant oppression, economic disparity, uncertainty, and instability. A world not so unlike our own. And yet, throughout the stories of Christ's birth, the whispers of angels deliver a surprising message: "Do not fear." In our own time, we might ask: is it even possible to be fearless in a fearful world? When Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the magi are each called into God's redemptive story, they do not deny their fears—they move through them. They ask questions, hold fast to courage, trust in good news, and say, "Here I am, Lord." When we find ourselves in fearful times, can we acknowledge our fears while also insisting on hope?

Every Advent, we light candles, sing carols, and pray for Christ's coming because we believe God entered a frightened world to bring good news. We hold onto hope because we believe that Christ did come—that's the promise of the season. Our hope is not flimsy or fleeting. It's gritty, resilient, and can endure—no matter what we fear or face. This season, let us insist on hope and trust that good news is greater than fear.

More than 80 people attended the Kairos on Senior Ministry on November 9! In our time together, we had vibrant discussions around questions of “how do we” and “how does society” define “senior”, the joys and challenges that come with growing older, and how our faith encourages us during this time. I shared what called me to this role as well as what I have been learning in my first few months as I meet with individuals and groups about exiting ministries and community resources. The developing mission statement for Senior Ministry at Incarnation is to increase opportunities for community, conversations, and care for those approaching retirement and beyond. Attendees were invited to write down specific ideas in response to the question “How can our senior ministry enhance your life, your life of faith, and/or enhance the life of a neighbor or friend through fun activities, meaningful conversations around hot topics, and responsive caregiving during times of changing health for you or your loved ones?” Here are some of the ideas that were given:

Solar Array Celebration



A celebration to inaugurate the startup of the Incarnation solar garden will be held from 10:00-10:15 am on Sunday, December 7, in Grace Hall East.

Also, there will be a solar garden information table in the atrium from 8:30 to Noon on 12/7. Members of the solar team will be available to answer questions, demonstrate live solar power generation, and give away electrical swag.

A dedicated team of Luther Dale, Dave Eckmann, Jim Fruehling, Tim Pratt, and Mike Vant led the development and implementation of the solar garden for Incarnation that would be one answer to Pastor Kai's challenge to help co-create a better and more loving world. This project has two primary goals: reduction in the burning of fossil fuels and electrical savings to be used for program enhancement and/or mortgage reduction.

Over the course of the three-year project the following key issues were addressed: selection of solar contractor Cedar Creek Energy, evaluation of roof vs. ground installation options, amendment to the North Oaks solar ordinance to allow a ground-based system, approval of a Conditional Use Permit by North Oaks, evaluation of funding options, new evergreens for additional screening, avoidance of new tariffs, and timing for the federal rebate.

The resulting 99kW solar garden will provide 90+ percent of ILC's electricity over the next 25 years with a projected electrical savings of over \$700,000. The project is fully funded by individual contributions and a 30% federal rebate.

Thanks to all who donated to the Building For Our Future campaign and for the support of the congregational council for making this facility a reality.

Today's Topic: Have Yourself a Kind Green Little Christmas

We are reminded daily that we are in high season for consumerism. We know that in caring for creation, our lifestyle is crucial to our impact on the earth. Reduce, reuse, and recycle should be our guidelines in order to help sustain God's creation. That can be especially difficult in this holiday season. Here are some ideas to help you have a more sustainable Green Christmas.

- Give experience gifts: theater or music tickets, creative experiences, or consumable gifts of food, drink, and care items.
- Use re-usable or recyclable wrapping: festive cloth scraps that can be tied with a cloth bow or gift bags, or, if that's not possible, recyclable wrapping paper. Note that most wrapping paper is not recyclable — one exception is brown craft paper, which you can dress up with a reusable ribbon.
- When choosing a Christmas tree try a live potted tree that can be planted (research what variety can grow here and how to acclimate it after the holidays), or real cut trees.
- When choosing decorations, avoid tinsel (plastic and hard to reuse). String popcorn and cranberries. Consider what ornaments are made of when purchasing. Avoid glitter — it's plastic and will prevent recycling of items it's attached to.
- Avoid food waste: send food home with your guests and plan quantities realistically.
- Shop second-hand and/or local: toys for the littlest ones, retro glassware or other unique gifts for your adult kids, or a new holiday outfit for yourself.
- Avoid disposable plates, utensils, and napkins: think about borrowing from family, friends, or other guests for really big gatherings.
- Make sure your lights are LED.
- Bonus idea: Give where it's really needed — consider charitable contributions. And simplify. Think about whether drawing names in your family makes sense, and maybe ultimately choosing a charity as a group, or have the choice rotate among family members each year.

As we close 2025, the Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) Action Group is preparing to host our next MobilePack™ at Incarnation from April 22-26, 2026. Our goal is to pack over 614,304 meals which will feed 1,683 kids one meal a day for one year. In order to do this, we have committed to raising \$180,000 to pay for the meals we pack.

Feed My Starving Children (FMSC) was founded in 1987 and is a Christian non-profit organization dedicated to seeing all of God's children whole in body and spirit. This is accomplished by providing nutritionally complete meals specifically formulated for malnourished children. Donations fund the meal ingredients and volunteers hand-pack the meals. Meals are donated to FMSC food partners around the world who handle distribution. Kids are fed and lives are saved!

Over the years, members of the Incarnation community and beyond have come together hosting the All Hands on Hope MobilePack. Together we have

packed over 9.8 million meals, feeding 27,106 children a meal per day for an entire year!

As we get underway with planning for the MobilePack, we are looking for local businesses and organizations to help us raise funds and provide volunteers to pack the meals. Your donation will be extremely impactful:

- \$5,000 sponsors 3 classrooms of local students to pack for one shift
- \$10,000 covers the cost to pack 41,667 meals – approximately 15% of our packing goal
- \$25,000 feeds three villages of 100 children for one year
- \$50,000 pays for 208,333 meals to feed 570 kids for one year

Part 2: Foundations of Hope: Ruth and David

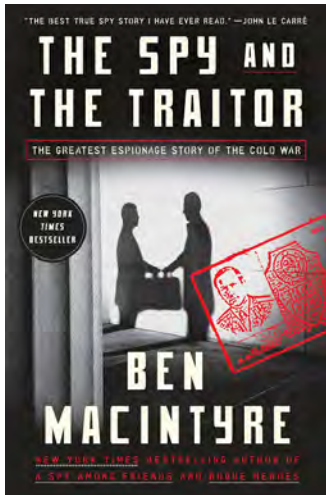

Time of the Child By Niall Williams

Time of the Child by Niall Williams returns readers to the town of Faha, a smaller and newly electrified town in Ireland in 1962. The beginning of December and the Advent Fair bring all sorts of people to the village—and an extra person, an infant found and brought to Dr. Troy. Troy's daughter, Ronnie, becomes attached to the baby and makes the family relationship between father and daughter the centerpiece of the story. There is a tender subplot of the church Canon sliding into dementia that is delicately and humorously handled, too.

This is very much a community as well as a family story. It is a reminder that miracles can still happen today. It is very much an Irish story with beautiful language meant to be read aloud as well as a Christmas story. Who could ask for more? (Unless it were to look for This is Happiness, another of Williams' stories about Faha.)

Carlson divides her book into several topics, such as “Blessings for Celebrating Christmas in the World,” which has blessings for mail carriers, Mall Santas, and wrapping presents. There are “Blessings for Holiday Travel”, Blessings for Holiday Grief”, and Blessings for the Holiday Table”.

She includes “Blessings for the Ancient Christmas Story” with special words for shepherds, angels, magi, and even Herod. There are also blessings for St. Nicholas, St. Lucia, and Our Lady of Guadalupe. There are Blessings for Each Day in Advent, as well as “Blessings for the Twelve Days of Christmas”.

This small book of blessings will fill your heart throughout the Advent and Christmas season.

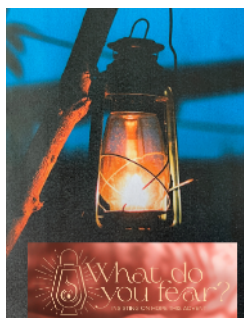

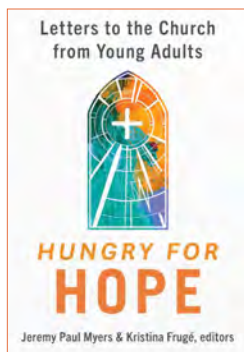

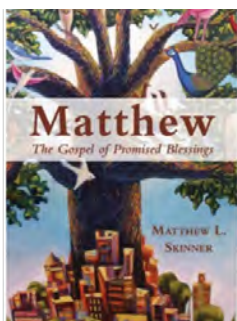
