

From the Pastor

Beginning Easter Sunday, we launch our sermon series, AWE! The background for this preaching theme comes from a book by Dacher Keltner, Awe: The New Science of Everyday Wonder and How it Can Transform Your Life. For Keltner, awe is defined as "the feeling we experience when we encounter vast mysteries that transcend our understanding of the

world." These experiences, says Keltner, open our minds and orient us toward big ideas and new insights.

Through his research, Keltner discovered that experiences of awe can affect our physiology, our spirituality, and our relationships with God and others. Awe can cool our immune systems inflammation response and strengthen our bodies. Experiences of AWE also elevate us out of ourselves, connecting us more deeply with the Spirit of God and with one another.

What inspires awe? Music inspires awe. Visual beauty. Nature. Collective effervescence (an experience of communal good will or joy or hope). Spiritual insights and epiphanies. What I found fascinating was that the number one awe-inspiring experience, across cultures, was hearing a story of personal courage, strength, and overcoming!

In my experience, awe can be both overwhelming and ordinary, eliciting a "Wow!" or a "that's cool!" In both

cases, though, I'm reminded that life isn't just about me. I'm part of a bigger story, a God sized story.

Through his research, Keltner discovered that just a few minutes of "Awe" a day could have transformative effect on our lives. So, let me ask you these questions:

What inspires "awe" in you?

Are there specific things you can do to give you a greater chance to experience awe?

If so, what is keeping you from doing them?

The resurrection stories and subsequent Easter stories are filled with awe and wonder. Our hope is to inspire you in worship and then encourage you, in everyday life, to intentionally seek out experiences of wonder and awe. We also hope you will use this season to extend yourself to a friend or neighbor and invite them to join you on this journey—in worship and in life.

Remember, a significant component of our spiritual lives is comprised of intention and purposeful decision. God's Spirit is available always and everywhere. How will you design your day, your week, your life to put you in the flow of God's "Awe" inspiring presence?

"A vision without a task is but a dream. A task without a vision is drudgery. A vision and a task are the hope of the world." ---Inscription on a church wall in Sussex England c. 1730

At a recent Faith and Work small group gathering, Bill Reichwald shared the above inscription

with our group. An inscription from a church wall in 1730 supports one of the Council's 2023 priorities, which is to create

a 3-year plan for Incarnation. It starts with a 3-year vision; followed by a plan to achieve it. As we look into the future, there are many opportunities for our church and our faith community. The Council is embarking upon a process to identify the outlook for our 3-year plan by meeting with groups of people including staff, Council, church leaders and interested congregation members. The first session was held on March 28 with the church staff, and we are developing plans to have more sessions. Identifying these opportunities will help ensure our vitality as a vibrant church now and in the future.

We have heard input from the congregation to expedite the reduction of our mortgage. And thanks to generous donors that have donated to our mortgage fund, the Finance Committee and Council approved the prepayment of three additional payments toward our mortgage in March. This aligns with one of the three pillars in the 3-year plan, which is "Responsible Stewardship."

CARE OF CREATION CORNER



April showers in cities often create runoff. With so much pavement the water picks up contaminants and races untreated to the nearest storm drains, negatively affecting water quality and harming wildlife and forestry. Lessen runoff damage: Avoid lawn chemicals, recycle motor oil, wash a car on grass or at a facility that filters wastewater, remove debris from sidewalks and driveways.

Listening and communicating is such an important aspect of our faith community. That is why the Council set another 2023 priority to increase our transparent communications. As mentioned in my February Lifetime article, the Council formed an ad-hoc communication committee consisting of Greta Grosch, Amy Johnson, Gil Hartley and Tracy Strantz. They met several times between

the February and March Council meetings and shared their recommendations at the March 20 meeting. There is more work to be done, however; the Council confirmed the following goals:

- 1. Improve communication to better inform, engage, and connect congregation, Council, and staff members.
- 2. Encourage broader participation between Council, Staff, Committees & Congregation in evaluating, prioritizing, and supporting areas of focus.
- Invite feedback and energize congregation in fulfilling Incarnation's mission, resulting in consistent demonstration of our core values and actions inside and outside our walls.

The work that the communication committee has completed thus far is nothing but awesome. It is enlightening to see how people's gifts are being utilized, along with the passion to continually strengthen and grow our church.



While it is clear that we need societal systems change and commitment for a sustainable future, by taking small steps, we as individuals can walk forward, living our values.


Just as spring is a time of renewal, we can revitalize our efforts to help with the renewal and stewardship of our planet.



April 2: Holy Week and Easter in Art

The powerful stories of Holy Week--the Entry into Jerusalem, the Last Supper, and Jesus' death, burial, and resurrection--have inspired artists over the centuries to create many beautiful and meaningful images. Kristin Anderson, Augsburg University art professor, explores a range of scenes from a variety of times and places in the Christian tradition.

April 9: Easter (No Kairos)





what came to him daily in his own prayer time. He beings each day in prayer, acknowledging the four directions, the earth, and the sky, and then, humbly, waits for the Spirit to speak to his heart. This title is a collection of the Spirit's messages, arranged in a sequence like the ladder in kiva leading from darkness to the light. The eight rungs of that ladder include the spiritual messages plus his own commentary on them.

Charleston uses broad language for the Spirit, the sacred – a place holder – for the conscious, spiritual presence many people from different religious traditions call God, or the creator. He believes that most people of faith are not one-dimensional beings but made up of many different spiritual practices and a lifetime of experience. He feels these messages can speak to all of us.

Reading from rung to rung I think you will agree. You will feel the movement from darkness to light. You may want to look to connect with him on social media to read more.

The Resurrection banner features a burst of light signifying Jesus Christ, the Sun of Righteousness (Malachi 4:2). The water moving toward the light suggests our life journey, buoyed by waters of Baptism, leading us toward our final resting place in heaven. White and gold, the liturgical colors for Easter season, symbolize purity, light, glory and joy.
