Then you think of what makes life worth living, where does your mind go? What are the experiences you are drawn to, the relationships that enliven you, the beliefs that guide you? This fall we will explore those questions and more in our sermon series, *Life Worth Living*. Let me be clear, this is not a judgment on the value of one person's life over another. This is an invitation to examine what makes your life meaningful, gives it purpose, provides direction, specifically as Jesus' followers.

In John 10, Jesus said, "I have come that you might have life and have it abundantly!" What did he mean then? What does it mean for us now? What gives worth and value to our living?

The themes we will explore include:

9/10: A Jesus' shaped vision for life: (Colossians 1: 15-20, Matthew 25: 31-46)

For Jesus' followers, life worth living begins by knowing, at an ever-deepening level, Jesus' vision for life. How did Jesus live? Who did he interact with? How did people respond?

9/17: You are here: (Romans 7:14-20, Luke 14: 15-24)

When we take a journey, we can only know the "way" to go if we have some sense of where we start and where we want to go? So, let's start with being honest about how we value and regard the spiritual journey. What do we desire? What are we willing to do?

9/24: What we focus on and do, we become: (Ephesians 3: 14-21, Mark 10:17-22)

Learning about the power of spiritual habits is essential for a transforming life. Spiritual practices strengthen our inner being, ground us in love, and help us make decisions about what life issues need to be addressed.

10/1: How then shall we live? (Philippians 4: 4-9, Luke 3: 7-14)

Doing what is good, honorable, and commendable (in Pauls' words from Philippians) is the invitation for the totality of our lives. Understanding our ordinary lives as places where God is present and alive is one of the great early journeys in a robust life of faith.

10/8: Your Life is plural: (Romans 9:9-18, Luke 5:27-32)

A full life isn't just the life we live. It is not just for us. A life worth living initiates learning spaces in our hearts for others who may live vastly different lives than our own.

10/15: One day at a time: (Colossians 3:12-17, Matthew 6: 25-34)

This "life worth living" doesn't develop overnight and, in fact, is a life-long quest lived wherever you find yourself and "one day at a time."

10/22: Failing and forgiving: (2 Corinthians 5: 16-19, Luke 7: 36-50).

How do we rebound and re-boot our relationships when our lives are not lived in the way that we desired or hoped? How do we forgive ourselves and move on without carrying the burden of guilt or shame?

Are these the only questions for a "life worth living?" No. But, this fall they will be our questions. There will be other ways you will be invited to deepen your immersion in these questions such as question guides for the sermons that you can use on your own or with a few others and small groups based on some of the primary themes.

As Jesus' followers, what makes your life meaningful, gives it purpose, guides your direction?

strategic plan is an important tool for any church that wants to be effective in its ministry. It provides a roadmap for the future, helping the church to focus its resources and efforts on achieving its goals. The plan will focus on where we want to go and how to get there. It also ensures that everyone is working towards the same goals.

Creating a strategic plan can be a challenge, but it is essential for any church that wants to be successful. The process can be like herding cats: you have a bunch of different people with different ideas and you're trying to get them all to agree on a single course of action. It's a lot of work, and it can be confusing. But with effort, the rewards can be great.

I am pleased to say that our church is currently in the process of creating a strategic plan. We started with initial vision concepts created by Pastor Kai, and we are now in the process of translating that vision into an actionable three-year strategic plan. We narrowed down all the vision ideas into three strategic pillars:

- 1. Deepening our Faith
- 2. Serving and Transforming our Community
- 3. Responsible Stewardship

Through a series of workshops and discussions, a large number of ideas were generated for each of the three pillars. These ideas are put into buckets, which we are calling "themes." Therefore, each pillar has at least two themes associated with it. And finally, out of each of the themes comes our three-year strategic goals.

The Evangelical Lutheran Church in America (ELCA) in 2019 authorized developing a social statement on government, civic engagement and the relationship of church and state that will be presented to an upcoming ELCA general assembly. The fundamental ELCA commitment: as we talk together about tough social issues, we form a community of moral deliberation. You have an opportunity to engage in study and discussion of civic life and faith based on a study by the ELCA in small group sessions facilitated by Carol Lacey or as part of a self-study. In the small group, each gathering will include prayer, scripture, discussion, and a chance to get to know one another. The group will not cover specific issues,

Here are some additional details about our strategic planning process:

- We are using a three-year planning cycle. This will allow us to make adjustments as needed, but it will also give us enough time to see the results of our efforts.
- We are using a collaborative approach. As mentioned above, we held a few workshops with staff, council and church leaders including committee chairs and past council presidents.
- We are identifying other ways to receive congregation input.
- We are using a results-oriented approach. We want to make sure that our plan is focused on achieving specific goals.
- We will begin the plan in 2024 and work to align our 2024 budget to the plan.

We believe that this strategic planning process will be a valuable tool for Incarnation. It will help us to focus our efforts, stay on track, use our financial resources wisely, and make a difference in people's lives.

Today Everything is Different: An Adventure in Prayer and Action by Dirk Lang

Dirk Lang, author of this interesting and thoughtful book, is on the faculty of Luther Seminary and serves as the General Secretary for Ecumenical Relations at the Lutheran World Federation. Many of us remember his worship planning for the Joint Catholic

Lutheran Commemoration of the 500 Years of Reformation held in Lund, Sweden in 2016.

Lang writes of his experiences with his lifelong learning to pray. He outlines a theology of prayer rooted in Martin Luther and relates one significant event/action which has had enormous influence on him and his life in prayer. He speaks of the communal prayer experience and witness of the clandestine prayer groups in East Germany which, during the 1980's grew, became more public, and whose occasional demonstrations led to the fall of the Berlin Wall in November 1989. He says these prayer groups were "an

example of church engaged in public spaces" even if they were essentially underground. Prayer took these groups of believers out into the streets and "peace silenced the powerful."

Because this book was being finished just as COVID began, Lang draws some interesting conclusions. He feels that the faith community is connected in communal prayer that is not defined by seeing faces on a screen or hearing each other read or sing. The Holy Spirit brings about a communion deep through bodies, our existence and through our hearts. He says, "Praying online, whether live-streamed or pre-recorded, heightens an awareness of a depth of communion that constitutes human reality. It does not create that communion."

Psalmody, silence, and prayer. This title will bring life to each of these parts of our faith lives. You will learn a lot by the quietly careful writing, the firsthand experiences, and the continued emphases on prayer and action.

On Saturday, August 5, from 12:00 – 4:00 p.m., a special Garden Party and Fundraiser will be held in an effort to help raise monies to purchase the land (currently owned by the St. Paul Water Dept.) so it can continue to host the
