

implementation in 2024 and beyond.


Our five priorities were:

- 2. Increase Transparent Communications: We established a Communication Committee that worked to foster open dialogue and keep everyone informed. We continue our commitment to transparency to strengthen trust and foster a sense of shared ownership.
- 3. **Conduct an Internal Financial Review:** Thanks to the team that conducted the financial review, we can be assured our financial practices are in good shape. There were a few recommendations to further strengthen our financial operations that will be implemented in 2024.
- 4. Create Future Budgets with Positive Net Contributions: We are committed to financial sustainability, ensuring that our giving outpaces our spending and allows us to invest in our future endeavors. Our proposed 2024 budget reflects our need for growth and financial strength.
- 5. **"Rethink" Giving:** We are partnering with Infinity Giving, an organization specializing in fundraising and sustainable giving models. Their expertise will be invaluable in securing the resources needed for our 3-year plan, capital projects, and building a long-term framework for financial stability.

Beyond these priorities, a task force completed a comprehensive capital plan to address the needs of our facility. We also established a dedicated Facilities Committee to oversee the implementation and ongoing capital plan projects and updates.

As we move forward, let us remember that Jesus' work guides our path towards a future filled with hope, love and service to others. With each step we take, with each act of generosity and collaboration, we become living testaments to His legacy, ensuring that the impact of His work continues as we serve others and transform hearts for generations to come.

In closing, I want to express my deepest gratitude to each member of the 2023 church council. You poured your time, talent, and passion into serving our congregation this year. The progress made on each priority, the foundation laid for future endeavors, and the spirit of teamwork that was present in all you did – thank you for your dedication and hard work.

Bread for the World Offering Letters


Our advocacy letters, e-mails and phone calls in support of those who live with hunger will happen earlier this year.


we are often swimming in toxic Metissa Jonnson, spectwaters. Melissa will help us look with a new lens at how to cultivate a healthy body image. She will explore:

Apostles Library Book Review

We live in diverse communities today that didn't exist even in the past 30 years. Our local schools host children with a multitude of languages; some speak only a language other than English in their homes. *The Arctic Quest* is a title by a Minnesota author, Minda Gomez, as part of a series of Martinez Kids' Adventures. It's best for upper elementary children

who can read it on their own or can be easily shared with a good read-aloud to those who are younger.

Gomez is a Minnesotan and ESL teacher with three bilingual children she refers to as "Mexigringo" blending her culture with that of her Mexican husband. She is passionate about teaching children and families to be proud of their bilingual "superpowers".

Helpfully for most of us, the book begins with a list of Spanish words with their pronunciations. The story is engaging as well as informative about the Arctic. And there is even a recipe for Tita's Atole de Avena, a hot oatmeal drink which sounds interesting! Sitting at the well with the Samaritan woman and Jesus in John 4 we learn key characteristics of what it looks like to follow Jesus. Karoline Lewis, Marbury E. Anderson Chair in Biblical Preaching at Luther Seminary, will guide us to listen in on this extraordinary conversation and invite us to think in new ways about what it means to follow Jesus.

Lewis holds degrees from Northwestern University (B.A.), Luther Seminary (M.Div.), and Emory University (Ph.D., New Testament Studies and Homiletics). She is the Program Director for the Festival of Homiletics, a contributing writer for Working Preacher, and co-host of the site's weekly podcast, Sermon Brainwave.

Lewis leads conferences, workshops, and retreats internationally on the Gospel of John, the New Testament, interpreting the Bible, preaching, leadership, women in ministry, and trips to the Holy Land. Lewis was one of a 100 religious scholars in the United States to be a part of the Values and Voices Campaign 2016 and again in 2021.

Pastor Kate Reuer Welton has worked as a community organizer and teacher in a wide range of places including Lutheran Social Service of MN, Kakuma refugee camp in Kenya, and Native Arts High School on Lake Street in Minneapolis. She completed a Master of Divinity degree at Harvard Divinity School. Called to serve as Campus Pastor at the University of Minnesota in 2010, she remains excited about proclaiming the Gospel in this lively context and working with student leaders to discern God's call for our community each year. Her approach to the Christian life? "Awe, wonder, and curiosity."

Eyes and sight, (not always physical!) is a consistent theme in the Bible. In these sessions we will explore the many references to eyes and the gift of seeing not just the world around us but seeing the presence of God. Gary Anderson, retired Incarnation senior pastor, will lead us to dig into both the Old and New Testaments and perhaps see scripture with new eyes.

A graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College, he received his M.Div. from Lutheran School of Theology, Chicago (LSTC). Following his 2004 retirement from Incarnation, he became interim seminary pastor at Luther Seminary for two years, then worked part-time for the Saint Paul Area Synod ELCA as director of "Crossing Bridges," a three-year, \$2 million mission appeal and later completed a six week interim pastorate at the English-speaking international congregation in Vilnius, Lithuania.

Year in Review and Looking Ahead in 2024

The Incarnation Feed My Starving Children Action Group along with our community of supporters has had a full and impactful year in 2023:

- Promoted and hosted three shifts per month at the FMSC permanent packing site in Coon Rapids
- Hosted the 16th All Hands on Hope MobilePackTM where 1,923 volunteers packed 582,336 meals which fed 1,595 kids for one year
- Volunteered at 3 different Food Truck Festivals over the summer, raising an amazing \$2,683 for our 2024 MobilePack.
- Attended the MobilePack Summit where we learned from and were inspired by other MobilePack Hosts and FMSC Staff.
- Packed meals at Target Field for FMSC's Pack in the Park event in August.

At Incarnation, we are encouraged to think about ways we can imagine and co-create a better and more loving world. As we turn the page to 2024, there are several ways you can do this by supporting Feed My Starving Children at Incarnation:

Volunteer:

Our 2024 All Hands on Hope MobilePackTM will be held at Incarnation April 24-28, 2024. We will need at least 2,000 volunteers to fill the packing room to reach our goal of packing 614,304 meals and feeding 1,683 kids for a year. Shifts are being finalized and will be published in early 2024. For now, mark your calendar for those important dates and bookmark our MobilePack web page for the latest news. Just one two-hour shift makes a major impact on world hunger. We love to see multiple generations of families, co-workers, civic organizations, student athletes, gym buddies and Incarnation small groups having fun and serving together.

We are also looking for volunteers to serve with our Action Group. We meet monthly to plan MobilePacks and coordinate other activities throughout the year, but volunteer commitment would vary depending on schedule and availability. Roles include volunteer recruitment and



The staff and Youth at LifeHaven send many thanks for the generous gifts from Incarnation through the LifeHaven Youth Holiday Gift Drive! There were more than 100 gifts (including six beautiful handmade crib quilts) given to twelve youth and fifteen children (including two babies expected soon!).

Sixty additional gifts were donated to the LifeHaven House and Program. This included items to welcome new youth to LifeHaven, such as robes and slippers. There were also items donated to help youth transition into independent living, such as pots and pans. In addition, \$655.00 in gift cards were donated to the LifeHaven Program for year-round use for birthdays, rewards for achieving set goals, use before benefits become available, and other emergency situations.

The LifeHaven House is at full capacity, housing and supporting six youth, four children, and two babies expected in the next few weeks! LifeHaven staff also continue to be a resource and support to six young adults and their children that have transitioned to independent living.

It was wonderful to kick off this giving opportunity at Incarnation's Ministry Fair. It gave so many of us the opportunity to hear what opportunities are available and learn more about the Youth, Children, and Program at LifeHaven. Thank you to so many who stopped by the LifeHaven Giving House before or after worship throughout Advent to ask questions about the program and share LifeHaven stories!
