We will light candles for our Incarnation community members who died in this past year and invite you to light an individual candle for a loved one. As a community, we can be people who rejoice with one another and weep with one another. That's what a Jesus community does!

Commitment Sunday: November 12. We will use this Sunday to celebrate the kind of community that Incarnation is becoming. If you haven't turned in your commitment card for 2024 ministry prior to the 12th you can bring it that day. As you come through the communion line you will receive a blessing from one of our leaders reminding you that we are on this journey together and any investment we make in time, energy, and money, IS WORTH IT!

Thanksgiving Sunday: November 19. We celebrate Thanksgiving together on the Sunday before many travel for their holiday gatherings. Throughout the hallways we will be celebrating our Church Without Walls Ministry Fair. Our core ministry partners will be present to share what they do and for you to make connection with them.

Think about this: At that point in the month, we will have had so much to celebrate together: New members in our community, students claiming their faith, the promise of Christ's presence in death and life, our ministry beyond the walls of the church, and our common commitment to one another and this ministry we get to do together.

And, there's more!

Sunday, November 26. Our worship theme for the Advent/Christmas Season launches: *Love Worth Experiencing!*

As we close out the year, remember that these are the core ministries that we support through the operating budget. We will need you to be generous as we close this year so we can be generative as we begin our common ministry in 2024.

As we enter the final two months of the year, I would like to take a moment to reflect on the work that our congregation and your 2023 council have accomplished over the past 10 months.

Capital Plan

The council and I are so grateful for the work of the Capital Plan Task Force, which

delivered a thorough and well laid-out three-year plan at the October council meeting. The plan includes a variety of important projects, such as a new roof, HVAC and window replacements, solar panels, parking lot improvements, and even repairs to the organ. The task force has also prioritized these projects. We will now begin to develop a

strategy to raise the funds required to implement the plan. In addition, the task force has recommended (and the council has approved) the formation of a Facilities Committee to work with staff to proactively manage and plan future capital projects. The overall goal is to have a five-year rolling plan that is well-managed. Internal Financial Review

We would also like to thank the team that volunteered to conduct an internal financial review. Their work is underway and will be completed before year-end with recommendations for areas of improvement and striving for best financial practices.

Three-Year Plan

Work continues in the development of the three-year plan. After a series of workshops, the framework has been completed and now staff is working on adding the "meat" to the plan. The plan is creating positive energy and will provide an exciting roadmap on how we can continue to grow and innovate new ways to transform more lives and in different ways.

Communication Committee

The Communication Committee continues to meet and listen. Our commitment is to continually find ways to increase transparent communications among staff, council, and the congregation. Some of our recent wins include the many requests for Bibles in the pews.

Giving

Unfortunately, our giving to the operating budget is down. In September, we fell short of our budgeted amount by \$98,600. As of September 30, our year-to-date giving is \$85,400 below our budget. In September's *Lifetimes*, I wrote an article about the importance of our operating budget. Bottom line: our operating budget provides the necessary resources to deepen faith, grow with Christ, create relationships, and touch many lives. Incarnation is a wonderful community and we have so much potential to continue to strengthen and grow as a church without walls. However, now is the time to give to our operating budget so that we can continue to grow our worship and music and serve all the ministries for our congregation.

congregation and the greater community.



This summer, Megan Salisbury, RN, (with her sons, Calvin and Jonah) spoke to the congregation about her experience as a pediatric ICU nurse and the vital role blood transfusion plays in the care of the babies she works with. Barb Davis would also like to encourage as many people as possible to donate and writes:

Red Cross Blood Drive - Set for November

"I've been living with multiple myeloma, a blood cancer, for 16 years. I've had two stem cell transplants, and both required lots and lots of whole blood, packed red blood cells, platelets and four infusions of



a component of plasma called IVIG which is derived from 3,000 to 10,000 donors for each dose! Without all of these blood products I would not have survived the stem cell transplants, and so would not be here today to help other myeloma patients, or see my daughter get married and give birth to our precious granddaughter.

I am eternally grateful to all donors who help me and other cancer patients. Blood is the gift of life."

November 5 and 6, Practicing Hope in a Season of Anxiety Marty Stortz, Professor Emerita Augsburg University

Marty Stortz, retired Christensen Chair in Religion and Vocation at Augsburg University, will begin this two-week series with a story and then distinguish between true hope and false hope, hoping for something and hoping in something, having hope and the sense that hope somehow has you, and hope as a kind of DYI matter and hoping with someone or a community.

In the second session, she will present a hope shaped by resurrection and etched on the bodies of believers in three central practices of the faith: mourning, breaking bread together, and baptizing. As they gather in community, Christians literally re-member themselves as people of hope.

Prior to her appointment at Augsburg, she was professor of historical theology and ethics at Graduate Theological Union, Berkeley. She is author of several books, including collaboration on "Hope" with Lutheran and Roman Catholic authors.

November 12 Sharing LSS Mission of Healing and Love Rev. Amanda Simons, Director of Church Partnerships and Volunteerism LSS-MN

Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota (LSS-MN), social ministry arm of the six ELCA synods of Minnesota, provides service in all Minnesota's 87 counties, reaching one in 65 Minnesotans annually. Rev. Amanda Simons, Director of Church Partnerships and Volunteerism LSS-MN, will focus on our shared mission of healing and love for the sake of our neighbors through Lifehaven, a supportive home for teen moms and their children, and other ministries in your community and across the state. Incarnation is a critical partner supporting this ministry, so together we express the love of Christ for all people through service that inspires hope, changes lives and builds community.

A graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College and the Lutheran School of Theology at Chicago, Simons is deeply passionate about local mission, community engagement, and advocacy, particularly for youth and young adults experiencing homelessness. Before this specialized ministry call through the St. Paul synod, she was pastor of Gustavus Adolphus Lutheran Church, St. Paul.

November 13 Humor in the Bible Michael Chan, Executive Director for Faith and Learning Concordia College, Moorhead

When people think about the Bible, they often think about an old, stuffy, and "holy" book. But what they often miss is that the Bible sometimes communicates its holy words in hilarious ways. Michael Chan, Executive Director for Faith and Learning at Concordia College, Moorhead, will explore the Bible's most humorous texts, not only for the sake of entertainment, but also to demonstrate that humor is an important way in which God can speak to us, not only in the Bible but also today.

Chan is a graduate of Pacific Lutheran University (B.A.), Luther Seminary (M.A. in Old Testament), and Emory University (Ph.D.). He has written many articles and books including *Introducing the Old Testament: A Historical, Literary, and Theological Survey* (with Rolf Jacobson). In addition to being a sought-after speaker and author, he also hosts the Gospel Beautiful podcast.




Men's History Book Group

Save the Date: April 24 – 28, 2024 at Incarnation

Mark your calendars for the All Hands on Hope Feed My Starving Children MobilePackTM happening at Incarnation Lutheran Church from April 24-28, 2024. Over five days, we will host 2,000 volunteers to pack over 600,000 meals to help feed children all over the world suffering from food insecurity.

This MobilePackTM makes it simple for our community to support our ministry partner, Feed My Starving Children, by showing up and positively impacting world hunger. Every year, millions of children die from preventable causes such as pneumonia, diarrhea, malaria, and undernutrition. Hunger is still causing nearly half of deaths in children under five years old. From this data, we estimate at least 6,200 children die each day from causes related to undernutrition. (Source: fmsc.org) By participating, you can help reach children who are negatively impacted.

This will be our 17th MobilePackTM held at Incarnation. Since 2007, we have hosted over 29,000 volunteers who have packed more than 9 million meals and raised over \$1.8 million to combat world hunger. We continue to work toward feeding kids, until all are fed.

Plans are being finalized now for daily shifts and times but we will need All Hands on Hope to make this happen. To help us prepare for the MobilePack $^{\rm TM}$, we are seeking volunteers to join our Action Group. The Action Group plans MobilePacks $^{\rm TM}$ and other ongoing efforts supporting

this valued ministry partner. Specifically, help is needed with fundraising, hospitality, volunteer recruitment/ registration and logistics coordination. We encourage all with a passion to feed God's hungry kids to join us and be a part of this exciting event. We are especially looking for



students who can help promote the MobilePackTM within their school communities.

The Action Group meets on the last Tuesday of each month from 5:00 - 7:00 p.m. throughout the year. Attendance depends on the task at hand. Members of a subcommittee may not need to attend the monthly meeting, but are always welcome.
