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Council Report - Strategic Plan Update

We are pleased to share with you the progress we are making on our strategic plan to guide our church into the future. The plan is based on three strategic pillars:

- 1. Deepening our Faith: Learning to live and love like Jesus, for a lifetime.
- 2. Serving and Transforming our Community: Cocreating a better, more loving world.
- 3. Responsible Stewardship: Caring for and sharing what God has first given us.

In this article, we would like to share our vision for success under the first pillar, *Deepening our Faith*. This pillar has two main themes:

- A. Innovate ways to encourage spiritual formation across life stages.
- B. Enrich our worship and music experience.

Below is a description of what success may look like for the two themes.

Theme A: Innovate ways to encourage spiritual formation across life stages.

Young adults will experience personal transformation, growing in character, relationships, and the ability to love and serve others. Seniors will experience physical and emotional well-being, connected to a supportive community, engaged in meaningful activities, and living with hope and peace. Children and youth will develop their gifts and talents, participating in a variety of activities that help them discover and develop their God-given gifts. People in life transitions will find hope and support, connecting with others who are going through similar experiences and receiving spiritual guidance and support as they navigate their transitions. Finally, through a spiritual growth training process, people will develop a deeper understanding of their faith, learning how to apply faith to their lives and grow in their relationship with Jesus.

Examples of success may include:

- A young adult coming to know Jesus and deepening their faith.
- A senior experiencing a renewed sense of purpose and belonging.
- A child developing a strong foundation in their faith that will carry them through their lives.
- A person in a life transition finding hope and support and discovering new purpose and direction.

- A preschooler developing a foundation in their faith and their social and emotional skills.
- A person of any age developing a deeper understanding of their faith and their spiritual gifts.

Theme B: Enrich our worship & music experience.

Worship services that are engaging, inspiring, and relevant to people of <u>all</u> ages and backgrounds. They are welcoming and inclusive and the worship space is flexible to meet the needs of a variety of worship styles. Students are involved in worship and they are passionate about using their gifts to lead others in worship.

This worship experience can have a profound impact on people's lives.

- A person who has been struggling with their faith could find a new sense of purpose and meaning.
- A student who is feeling lost and alone could find a sense of community and belonging.
- A family who is new to the area could feel welcome and included.
- A student who is passionate about music could discover their calling as a worship leader.


It is exciting to envision the future and develop a plan to achieve it. The planning process will continue through the fall; however, we continually looking for additional input and feedback.

grown more rancorous over the past forty years. Crossan, however, makes clear that this debate isn't new; it can be found in the New Testament itself, most notably in the tensions between Luke-Acts and Revelation.

In the texts of Luke-Acts, Rome is considered favorably. In the book of Revelation, Rome is seen as the embodiment of evil in the world. Yet there is an alternative to these two extremes, Crossan explains. The historical Jesus and Paul, the earliest Christian teachers, were both strongly opposed to Rome, yet neither demonized the Empire. Crossan sees in Jesus and Paul's approach a model for Christians today that can be used to cut through the acrimony and polarization roiling our society and dividing us.

Appendices and notes will help you as you read and ponder his look at culture wars both then and now.

Red Cross Blood Drive - Set for November

Barb Davis would also like to encourage as many people as possible to donate and writes:

"I've been living with multiple myeloma, a blood cancer, for 16 years. I've had two stem cell transplants, and both required lots and lots of whole blood, packed red blood cells, platelets and four infusions of a component of plasma called IVIG which is derived from 3,000 to 10,000 donors for each dose! Without all of these blood products I would not have survived the stem cell transplants, and so would not be here today to help other myeloma patients, or see my daughter get married and give birth to our precious granddaughter.

I am eternally grateful to all donors who help me and other cancer patients. Blood is the gift of life."

Oct. 8: MicroGrants and Lights On! Don Samuels, CEO MicroGrants & Lights On!

Charitable work often perpetuates poverty and dependency and is based on a presumption of hierarchy. We are more often moved more by our own assets, our own timing, and our own sentiments in how we give and serve. We are seldom moved by the pains, priorities, or opportunities of the objects of our charity. Don Samuels, CEO of MicroGrants and Lights On!, will share efforts to do charity differently in a way that prioritizes timing, healing and prosperity in ways that might lead, more quickly, to equality, grants to low income-people of potential to boost a business, education, or career.

Oct. 15 & Oct 16: Bega Kwa Bega: Scholarships Harold Torunsky, Bega Kwa Bega group

Incarnation has a long history of working with our ministry partners, Mkwawa and Kigamboni in Iringa, Tanzania, through prayer, presence, and projects that include scholarships and capital investments.

Hear stories of those who have benefitted from this partnership as Harold Torunsky, leader of Incarnation's Tanzania Action Group (TZAG) leads discussion of the Bega Kwa Bega (Shoulder to Shoulder) accompaniment approach to missions and how Incarnation could learn from its ministry partners to fulfill the Great Commission.

This connects with a "special ask" for funding to further the progress and future goals of this global ministry, which in the past has been funded in part by Incarnation's regular budget.

Oct. 22: Luther and Vocation Mary Gaebler, Religion Professor Gustavus Adolphus College

Mary Gaebler, Religion Professor at Gustavus Adolphus College, will focus on rediscovery of the Gospel by way of God's power and presence, made manifest in a "call," what "cooperation" with God means and how we experience it. Gaebler will emphasize the "gift" element of God's calling through Christian vocation and consider parallels between how empowering this was in Luther's day, and how empowering it can be for us in our present historical context.

Oct. 29, 30 and Nov. 5, 6: Practicing Hope in a Time of Anxiety Marty Stortz, Professor Emerita Augsburg University


Marty Stortz, retired Christensen Chair in Religion and Vocation at Augsburg University, will begin this two-week series with a story and then distinguish between true hope and false hope, hoping for something and hoping in something, having hope and the sense that hope somehow has you, and hope as a kind of DYI matter and hoping with someone or a community.

• Participants park their cars, trucks, vans, etc. in the church parking lot and kids walk to the trunks of the vehicles to get candy and treats.


How can I participate?

The FMSC Action Team and members of the Incarnation community were busy all summer volunteering at various events and preparing for our next MobilePackTM.

Each month throughout the year, volunteers gather at the FMSC permanent packing site in Coon Rapids. These are standing reservations on the same days/times each month for a two-hour packing shift with other members of our Incarnation community. There is always room for all to join in the fun and an easy way to make a difference. You can find more information here including links for registration for future dates.

- There were three different Food Truck Festivals in Hopkins, St. Paul and Anoka where Incarnation members were encouraged to volunteer. Eleven volunteers donated their time to check IDs, secure wristbands, sell water and provide general information to attendees. These volunteers provided 42 hours of service which earned \$2,683 towards our 2024 All Hands on Hope MobilePackTM! Thank you to those who volunteered to help feed starving kids.
- In August, several members of the FMSC Action Group attended the MobilePack[™] Summit in Burnsville, MN, sponsored by FMSC. For two days, the team met with FMSC staff members and other MobilePack hosts from around the country to share strategies and tactics for leading a successful event. The team toured the machine packing facility and the Marketplace fulfillment center in Eagan. In addition, they learned how FMSC coordinates getting meals to in-country Partners and even heard from one of the partner organizations on specific work they are doing around the globe. After the summit, the team headed to Target Field to participate in the Pack at the Park MobilePack[™].
