

September 17


Where Rivers Part: a Story of My Mother's Life by Kao Kalia Yang; 336 pg

October 15


Necessary Trouble: Growing Up at Midcentury by Drew Gilpin Faust; 336 pg


January 21 Song for a Whale by Lynne Kelly; 420 pg

February 18


The Personal Librarian by Marie Benedict and Victoria Murray; 368 pg

March 18


The Hiding Place by Corrie ten Boom; 272 pg



A historical novel of the first licensed female watchmaker in the Netherlands who became a heroine of the Resistance, a survivor of Hitler's concentration camps, and one of the most remarkable ministers of hope in the twentieth century. Her incredible true story tells how faith, hope, and forgiveness triumph over unthinkable evil.

Trailer Baby by Kathryn Pearson; 316 pg



A woman is bored with her job, her marriage is falling apart, her 15-year old daughter has an attitude, when they discover the daughter is pregnant by a boy from "across the tracks." An honest, yet uplifting story of hope and healing and how the heart can overcome fears and open up to love.

May 20 Sipsworth by Simon Van Booy: 240 pg



A woman loses her husband and son, moves back to the village of her childhood, and allows her life to become static. Then, one cold winter night, she has a chance encounter with a mouse that sends her on a surprising journey. Over the course of two weeks, this reclusive widow discovers an unexpected reason to live.
